

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
Dear Friends,

Catholic Charities brings the love and the hope of Jesus Christ to our most poor and vulnerable brothers and sisters. The Diocese of Colorado Springs donates funds and in-kind services to Catholic Charities so that more than 95% of your donations can go directly to programs here in our community.

The Marian House Soup Kitchen serves an average of 600 hot meals each day, 365 days each year. The Hanifen Center at the Marian House provides clothing, supplies, and case management services to hundreds of individuals. By cooperating with other local agencies, the Hanifen Center provides integrated assistance to help break the cycle of poverty.

Catholic Charities' Life Connections Program provides crisis pregnancy counseling, foster care, and adoption services to those who value the dignity of all human life. Its Family Immigration Services Department provides accredited counseling and assistance to refugees and immigrants who need help on the path towards citizenship.

Waldo Canyon Fire A Community in Crisis

On June 23, 2012, the Waldo Canyon Fire (WCF) broke out in Pike National Forest, just outside the city. Given the dry conditions, the fire was expected to be bad, but no one could fathom what occurred over the next week as the fire spread along the mountain range from 24th Street to the Air Force Academy.

During the initial days of the fire, our CEO, Mark Rohlena, and our VP for Poverty Reduction Services, Sam Edwards, were out in the community on a daily basis, assessing how Catholic Charities could help.

The Red Cross and Salvation Army asked us to provide meals and snacks at four evacuation shelters, so we asked the community to help. The response was overwhelming. Monetary gifts, in-kind donations, and volunteer support came from all over the country, allowing us to serve almost 2,500 total meals in addition to the 600+ meals served daily in our soup kitchen.

We helped people sift through the remains of their homes, and provided shovels, rakes, clothing, food boxes, gift cards, gas cards, counseling and spiritual support, along with our full menu of daily services to anyone who needed help. We will continue to provide WCF support for quite some time.



LAS POSADAS

Las Posadas is a re-enactment of the search of Mary and Joseph for a place for Jesus to be born. This event is a devotion that takes on the richness of an Hispanic-style of praise and singing, and serves as a fund-raiser for Family Immigration Services (FIS), allowing the staff to help families who have immigrated to our community. FIS gives immigrants a hand by leading them through the process of citizenship and residency, or helping them develop their ability to speak English well.

The inaugural event was a tremendous success, raising \$4,000, with a standing room only crowd. There was music, dancing, and traditional Mexican food such as tamales, enchiladas, beans, rice, and green chili.

The event also served as the culmination of FIS participation in the communitywide giving program, Indy GIVE!

ADOPT-A-FAMILY PROGRAM

In FY 2010/11, Catholic Charities developed a special program allowing donor donors to "walk" with our clients in a meaningful way. Peak Producers, a group of top realtors in our community, became the first organization to participate in the program, and continued sponsorship through FY 2011/12.

Families selected for this year-long adoption, received intensive case management support to make a long-

term, sustaining difference in their lives. To achieve this, the Peak Producers only contributed not money and in-kind goods, but offered personal and business connections which were critical in moving the families to a higher level of stability. As a result, these families were "fast-tracked" on the road to self-sufficiency to an extent Catholic Charities would not have been able to do alone.

Family Immigration Services Welcoming the Stranger

Family Immigration Services (FIS) continued to expand programs to the "Stranger Among Us" through English as a Second Language (ESL) classes and Naturalization and Immigration Services (NIS). Through our qualified Bureau of Immigration Services (BIS) certified staff, we provide professional counseling and guidance to help immigrants navigate the process of becoming a legal resident. Recently, services have increased in the areas of: • Abuse - helping women who previously could not

- obtain residency without applying through their abuser
- Family Reunification helping relatives of people living in the United States with the application process in their home country

Life Connections assists women and families in all areas of pregnancy and adoption through counseling, support and educational instruction. Licensed and compassionate counselors guide individuals and families through the sometimes difficult and stressful process of deciding to relinquish a child or expand a family. Programs offered are Pregnancy Support Services, Relinquishment Counseling, Adoption Support Services, Counseling Services, Post-Abortion Support, and Life Skills educational programs.



The Marian House Complex A Place of Help & Hope

Marian House is a place where people come to feel safe, receive help, and try to move towards greater self-sufficiency. It is a place where they know they will be welcomed and receive a helping hand. Most people who come to the Marian House initially come for a hot, nutritious meal at the soup kitchen. Once trust is established there, many will walk through the doors of the Hanifen Center at Marian House to receive help in their quest for self-sufficiency to move forward in life.

Life Connections Helping Families Become Whole



Life Connections unveiled its Early Literacy program in May 2012. It is a partnership with United Way's Success By 6 initiative, to provide young children with books. This adventure into the imagination is a result of help from parishes, scouts, students, teachers and early literacy minded individuals who have donated, or encouraged others to donate, children's books to Catholic Charities. Children and parents are thrilled to have an outlet to receive free books.

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
The campaign to pay for the cost of building the new Marian House was re-launched in September 2011 as the Building Futures Together campaign. Its sole purpose is to raise \$2.4 million to pay off the construction debt so efforts could be directed to expanding Marian House programs. Through fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, \$518,945 had been raised towards the goal.

Marian House Soup Kitchen Feeding the Hungry

In recent years, the Marian House Soup Kitchen (MHSK) has served more than 200,000 hot, nutritious meals per year; more then 600 meals most days, 365 days a year. That number tends to increase beginning the middle of the month as monthly incomes begin to be exhausted. Many guests tell us if not for

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MHSK, they would be homeless. The monies saved on food, allows them to redirect funds to rent and utilities.

MHSK depends heavily on volunteers to carry out this ministry. We are blessed to have so many people who volunteer their time to help feed people who are hungry.

Marian House Client Services Helping Families Achieve Self-Sufficiency

Marian House Client Services' goal is to help clients move to higher levels of self-sufficiency. Our staff and volunteers may be just the friends and family our guests need to get through the day.

Self-sufficiency is different for everyone. For some, it is achieving financial independence - finally managing to balance income to expense. For others, it is acquiring better parenting skills to help balance family dynamics. It is putting a plan in place that ultimately gets a person or family stable and moving towards life changing goals.

Marian House Community Outreach Bringing Services to the Surrounding Community

Marian House Community Outreach delivers goods and services to people who cannot come to our facility, usually due to transportation, child-care, or disability issues. We also make regular deliveries of food and clothing to rural communities such as Ellicott, Hanover, Fountain, Yoder and Leadville.

In addition to delivering goods and services, Community Outreach picks up donations that cannot be delivered to our facility, usually large furniture items. These donations are almost immediately delivered to clients who have requested them.

The holidays are a particularly busy time for our Outreach program. Requests for food baskets increase significantly as most of our clients would not have a holiday dinner if not for the food baskets that have become a staple of our program.

This past year, our Outreach team was called upon to help the victims of the Waldo Canyon Fire. Deliveries of material goods and tools to help homeowners sift through the rubble were in high demand.

Marian House Life Support Services Helping Families with Children

Providing assistance to families with children is the main goal of Marian House Life Support Services (LSS). The average annual income level of the families who come to LSS for assistance is \$7,400. The material goods they receive help for assistance is \$7,400. The material goods they receive help

bridge the gap to make ends meet. Many of our families are single mothers with children who are receiving food stamps and Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) support, but it is not enough so they must seek help with clothing and baby needs. Families are allowed to receive a specific number of clothing items per child / per season, and are encouraged to "shop" in the "store" as often as necessary to reach that limit.

LSS offers two programs that are intended to strengthen the parent/child bond by letting parents give new gifts to their children for birthdays and Christmas. Most of these families would not be able to afford to do this on their



Parish Social Ministries A Partnership with Parishes

Financial Accountability

Operating Revenue - \$4,695,281

Parish Social Ministries (PSM) administers the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) and Catholic Relief Services (CRS) mini-grant programs funded by locally retained funds from the national collections. This year, PSM also hosted a Social Ministry Gathering.

CATHOLIC CAMPAIGN FOR HUMAN DEVELOPMENT

One of the CCHD mini-grant recipients was Fostering Hope Foundation. During FY 2011-2012, the Diocese of Colorado Springs sponsored a Fostering Hope team which supported



a foster family with high risk teenagers. Preserving the foster placement is critical to breaking the cycle of destructive behavior and long-term poverty for kids. The Fostering Hope Foundation teams, which are congregation based, aid foster

parents to strengthen the foster home placement and build long-term stability for struggling children.





CRS is motivated by the gospel of Jesus Christ to cherish, preserve and uphold the sacredness and dignity of all human life, foster charity and justice, and embody Catholic social and moral teaching. CRS programming promotes human development by responding to major emergencies, fighting disease and poverty, and nurturing peaceful and just societies.
