# **JORGE & ABBY: A SUCCESS STORY** HOUSED TO HOMELESSNESS, OVERCOMING HEALTH ISSUES, REGAINING STABILITY

Jorge and his mother, Abby, were living a comfortable life until COVID struck. His employer closed down his business, leaving Jorge unemployed with limited savings. When his mother had a stroke, he didn't know what to do next. He moved their belongings to storage and began living in his car. When his mother was released from the hospital, they moved to a motel until funds began running low, then back to his car. At one point he was unable to make his car payment and the thought of losing his vehicle took on a whole new meaning now that it served as their home. With so much uncertainty, Abby asked him to go to Catholic Charities for help.

Jorge visited the Hanifen Employment Center daily, using the computer lab for employment resources and working with his case manager. He was offered a great job, but where would his mother stay while he was working a 12-hour shift? She could not drive. She could not be left alone. He could not leave her in the parking lot of a distribution warehouse. He could not take the job and was devastated but kept holding on to the words of his case manager, "Don't give up. Keep fighting."

When a friend invited Jorge and his mother to stay with her, Jorge began to find hope. He refocused on his job search and continued working with his case manager. He found a new job, began saving money, and started his search for a new place to live. Jorge was ready to get his life back. As for his mom, having a safe place to stay and not worry about finances for a brief time helped her heal.



# From the CEO: Andy Barton



In June, a local service provider and a Catholic Charities partner agency called Family Promise announced that they would be closing their shelter for homeless families. The New Promise Shelter opened two years ago and provided a critical service in the homelessness response system. Operating in a repurposed motel on South Nevada, New Promise provided 15 rooms for families who would otherwise be sleeping in tents or in their cars. While in shelter, families worked with Family Promise staff - and often with Life Coaches from Catholic Charities - toward more stable housing options. The loss leaves a massive gap in services for the most vulnerable families in Colorado Springs.

The impact of the New Promise closure will be felt by all providers of family services in the community. For the Life Coaches in the Catholic Charities Family Connections program, it takes away the option for one of the most critical steps families need in moving from crisis to stability. It is both the overall reduction in the community's shelter capacity as well as the loss of the noncongregant family shelter that creates pain points for the system. Congregant shelter (where people sleep in beds or cots in one large room) remains available for families in Colorado Springs but that option comes with limitations. Since males and females are separated in congregant settings, multigender families are forced to split up while in the shelter. Families frequently refuse congregant shelter, even when it means staying outside.

There is a cautionary component to what prompted the decision to close the New Promise Shelter. Like Catholic Charities, Family Promise relies on a variety of funding sources to do their work,

> and individual donations are the core financial support. Family Promise cited a \$150,000 decrease in donations since 2020 as the reason that they could not continue operating the shelter.

> Philanthropic support for human service agencies has fluctuated dramatically over the past three years. Giving had declined leading up to and through the first part of the pandemic only to rebound to record levels through the middle stages of COVID. If the loss of funding at Family Promise signals a larger trend, it could be devastating for the charitable service sector and those we serve.

> Inflation and talk of recession play a major role in the pullback on philanthropic giving; but in a frustrating "Catch 22," these economic factors simultaneously increase the need for charitable giving. As one small example, the National Energy Assistance Directors Association estimated in June that low-income households, those making an average of \$26,400 annually, will spend 25.7% of their income on gas and home energy bills. That leaves very little for families to spend on housing, child care, food, and other essential items. Higher prices of gas and food coupled with skyrocketing housing costs are hitting our poor and vulnerable disproportionately hard.

> Because of your support, Catholic Charities can provide preventative support for those who are on the verge of homelessness, and we will help fill the hole that the closure of the New Promise Shelter leaves in the community. Your gifts make it possible: thank you for sticking with us. With your ongoing help, we will continue to support the women, men and children who are

# **Disaster Case Management** A Collaboration in Lake County

**PROGRAMS & EVENTS** 



Prolonged power outages are an unwelcome reality in Leadville, Colorado. In December 2021, the town lost power for five hours. When a generator failed at the Lake County Courthouse, the emergency dispatch housed in that building was unable to operate for several hours. Since power losses are often a result of natural disasters such as forest fires or blizzards, losing the ability to communicate with primary responders can be a lifeor-death breakdown.

In the aftermath of the December event, Lake County Public Works worked with Catholic Charities to help fund a solution. Utilizing a grant that was specifically designated for disaster response in rural communities, Catholic Charities provided \$11,600

to Lake County to purchase and install generator "hookups" at the courthouse. This upgrade will allow for backup generators to be used in emergencies, ensuring that power will be available in future outages. The grant also paid for two laptop computers and enhanced "JAWS" software for use during an emergency.

An added benefit of the partnership between Lake County Government and Catholic Charities was the development of a virtual disaster case management (VDCM) plan. The VCDM establishes a process for residents of Lake County to connect virtually with Catholic Charities case managers in the event of a disaster. Case managers can to help with housing, food, and other emergency needs to supplement the work of the agency and Lake County Human Services. Space has been identified at the Lake County Courthouse to be set up for this confidential virtual case management as the need arises.

Catholic Charities (CC) agencies have been helping refugees from all parts of the world for years. CC Denver received special funding to organize legal

Volunteers help complete residency paperwork. workshops throughout Colorado to help hundreds of Afghan families complete and submit asylum applications. The Colorado Lawyers Committee is recruiting, training, and organizing volunteers for these events.

On July 16, CC Central Colorado partnered with CC Denver to hold a workshop - the first in the region, at the Marian House Hanifen Center. Seventeen families were assigned four volunteers each - including a translator and a lawyer. Throughout the day, more volunteers assisted with logistics and by days end, the paperwork had been completed, reviewed, and prepared for submission.

Those leading this effort feel a weight on their shoulders to get all the Afghan refugees' paperwork done completely, correctly, and within the allotted time - one year from the time of arrival in the United States - so their applications can be processed, allowing them to safely remain in the United States. Most of these families faced extreme danger in their home country because they supported the United States troops during the occupation before the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan. Asylum applications are complicated and very difficult to complete without legal assistance.
